




Code for America, a nonprofit organization modeled after Teach for America, built <u>Clear My Record</u>, a tool that helps people with old criminal convictions get them reduced or expunged, which makes it easier for them to find housing and get jobs. This year, the team formed a <u>partnership</u> with George Gascón, the San Francisco district attorney, to work on a new program that automates the process of expunging marijuana-related convictions under the state's legalization laws. The group aims to remove 250,000 convictions by the end of 2019.

Paper Prisons



8 million California residents have criminal convictions on their records that hamper their ability to find work, housing, secure public benefits, and access educational opportunities.

Having a criminal record reduces the chance of getting a job offer or callback by **50%**.

The U.S. loses roughly **\$65 billion** per year in terms of gross domestic product due to employment losses among people with criminal records.

What Is AB 1076



AB 1076 is a groundbreaking, comprehensive clean slate effort that leverages technology to clear records at scale by automating existing laws.

- Automatically clears records for arrests that did not result in conviction after the statute of limitations has passed.
- ii. Automatically clears convictions with local sentences to probation and jail once the sentence is completed for persons who have remained crime free.

AB 1076 efficiently automates both arrest and conviction relief through centralized implementation at the California Department of Justice by updating records stored in statewide criminal record databases.
